Thought for the Week:

This year the Church gives us Mark's Gospel at Mass each Sunday, and even though we are only in the first chapter, we hear of Jesus beginning his ministry with great zeal, healing the sick, curing many who are suffering, and travelling throughout Galilee, preaching the Good News. This is indeed an action-packed Gospel! In hearing of Jesus' fervour to tell people and show people what he knew about God, Jesus' desire for evangelisation should be an example to each of us. Perhaps we won't be able to physically heal those who are sick, but how much healing comes from a kindly word, a remembrance of someone unable to leave their home, a telephone call to brighten a day? We never hear of Jesus writing letters or gospels: his way of communicating the Word was simply by *being* with people, by speaking to them in parables, and by showing God's love for them in the miracles he worked. Earlier this week we heard the Gospel account of Jesus trying to heal in his home town and being unable to, because the people did not have faith. In contrast, for those people who *did* have faith in him, the miracles are numerous. What does this tell us?

We often pray for those who are sick and suffering, and rightly so; we will celebrate on Saturday the memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes, which is the World Day of Prayer for the Sick. The example of Jesus today shows us that prayer alone is not enough; we are called to be in community, to be with other people, and to help each other in whatever ways we can. Through our lived example of Christian life we will inspire others and ease their burdens, whatever they may be. As Saint Paul says today: 'Do you know what my reward is? To be able to offer the Good News free'. What a challenge this is for us—we pray we may not fail!



Financial Update – 31st January

This week I have submitted the parish's Gift Aid return for the quarter ending 31.12.11. It is interesting to note the following figures:

- of the total amount given in envelopes, 52% is NOT gift aided.
- of the total amount given by standing orders, 14% is NOT gift aided.
- the average quarterly repayment from the Treasury is £2,745.

If half of the above non gift aid planned giving parishioners signed a gift aid declaration, then the parish could receive an extra £906 per quarter or £3,624 per year.

If you are a UK tax payer and a planned giver by envelope or standing order and have *not* signed up for gift aid, and are in a position to do so, please give the matter serious consideration. For every £1 give by you in planned giving, the parish receives an extra **25 pence** from the Treasury.

If you require a declaration form, please put your name and address in an envelope in the 2a letterbox, or speak to one of the clergy, and I will post a form to you.

Pilgrimage to Lourdes

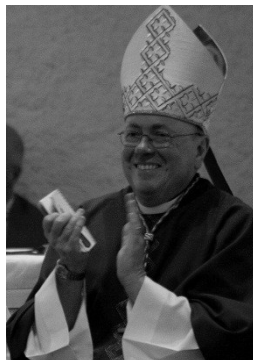

Bishop Malcolm

The Sacraments -

Over the past couple of weeks we've considered the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation, which are the first two of the three sacraments of initiation. Although – in this country at least – the sacrament of Confirmation is often the final sacrament of initiation received, the traditional order (which Pope Benedict XVI is keen to see restored) sees the sacrament of the Eucharist being received as the culmination of our initiation as Christians and Catholics. Today we'll look at this sacrament which is both familiar and yet mysterious.

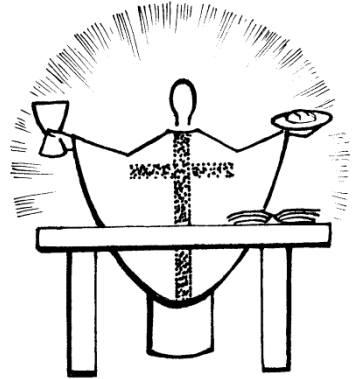
I'm sure almost all of us have happy memories of the day we made our First Holy Communion; whether this was as a child, or later in our life, it was a day marking the culmination of a journey of preparation, longing and expectancy; finally being able to fully participate in the Mass and receive Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Certainly for those children in our parish who were enrolled in their journey towards the sacraments of Penance and Eucharist two weeks ago, their First Holy Communion day will be one to remember for many years, and such occasions are a reminder to each one of us of the time when we, too, were walking the path which is currently theirs. To receive the Eucharist is the greatest gift that God has given to us, one which (unlike the other sacraments of initiation) we are invited to receive again and again, almost as often as we come to Mass (we may receive the Eucharist no more than twice on any one day, even if we go to Mass a third time; cf Code of Canon Law 917). However, up until the early part of the twentieth century the frequent reception of Holy Communion was rare, and it was Pope Saint Pius X who reinvigorated and gave official sanction to the frequent – indeed daily – reception of Holy Communion. It's perhaps strange to think that, for many years, people would faithfully go to Mass, but not receive Communion. To most of us, today, the reception of Communion at Mass is not only the high point of the Mass, but also of our week's prayer.



To gain an understanding of the sacrament of the Eucharist we can start in no better place than St John's Gospel, chapter six, and especially verse 35: 'I am the bread of life. No one who comes to me will ever hunger; no one who believes in me will ever thirst.' We hear these familiar words often at Mass, and in hymns, and might even use them in our prayer life; they are so utterly profound, linking as they do the person of Jesus to the food for eternal life which he leaves for us. In the other three gospels, the synoptics of Saints Matthew, Mark and Luke, we have accounts of the Last Supper, at which Jesus explained in different words the gift of the Eucharist that he was leaving for his disciples, and indeed for

all of us. 'This is my body given for you . . . this cup is the new covenant in my blood poured out for you' (Luke 22:19-20, and cf Matthew 26:26-28 and Mark 14:22-24). However the earliest written account of this Eucharistic theology comes not from the gospels but from the letters of Saint Paul; in his first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 11, verses 23-27, he describes very simply the offering of Jesus which we recognise immediately as the same offering we see made every time we go to Mass. What was being described in the very first years of Christianity is still a reality for us in our own time.

All of this is very familiar to us, and yet at the same time there is the mystery: what *does* happen at Mass? What *is* the Eucharist? We know that bread and wine are brought to the priest at the offertory of the Mass, and that through his actions this everyday food and drink becomes really Jesus, present amongst us. No longer are bread and wine on the altar, but Jesus is there, 'his Body and his Blood, with his soul and his divinity' (Catechism 1413). The actions of the priest are no mere historical re-enactment of the Last Supper; rather, that bloodless sacrifice of Jesus, which prefigured his bloody sacrifice on the Cross, is made real again for us, in our midst. This is called the *anamnesis*, the re-making present. This happens through the power of the Holy Spirit, working in the priest, who is invoked during the Eucharistic Prayer to hallow our offering, the *epiclesis*. These two actions taken together, the anamnesis and epiclesis, transubstantiate the bread and wine; the bread and wine are no longer present, instead, Jesus is with us.



Following from this, we can see why we give such honour to the Blessed Sacrament, for we are honouring not just a sacrament, but God himself. We genuflect not when we just enter a church, but rather when we are in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. We make time to adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament through our periods of exposition – worship of God on the altar. We will be reviving this devotion in our parish each Thursday, starting this week, immediately after the morning Mass, and all who are able are encouraged to participate. And we honour God by making sure that we are in a state of grace before we come to Holy Communion, in other words, we should receive the sacrament of Confession before Communion

if we are aware of any grave sin in our life, or make a perfect act of contrition before Communion, if we are unable to receive Confession in time, with the resolution of receiving sacramental Confession as soon as possible afterwards.



The Eucharist is the 'source and summit' (Lumen Gentium, 11) of our Christian lives; we begin from Christ on our Christian journey, and, strengthened by his heavenly food, it is to Him that we return.

Parish Mission

Odette Millar – Catholic Women’s League member
